## Birding Opportunities at Pig's Eye Heron Rookery SNA

This metropolitan site, named after its famous settler, Pig's Eye Perrant, is notable for being one of the largest nesting sites for colonial waterbirds within the state. Although only 100 acres in size, its floodplain forest is teeming with bird life. Species that nest in the rookery include great blue heron, great egret, black-crowned night-heron, doublecrested cormorant, and yellow-crowned night heron. This is one of the four places in the state where yellow-crowned night herons are known to nest. Bald eagles also nest in the immediate vicinity and may often be seen roosting in trees on the island. In addition to its importance as a nesting colony site, the area surrounding the island is a major resting, loafing and feeding area for large numbers of American white pelicans and ring-billed gulls, especially in the fall. A total of 89 species have been documented on the island. As the site is an island, access is by canoe or boat, but the area is off-limits to birders from March-July due to its status as an active waterbird colony site. Birder access is difficult.

## Taxonomy, Season and Abundance Key

The names and taxonomic arrangement of species follows that of the Checklist of the Birds of Minnesota (January, 2005) prepared by the Minnesota Ornithological Union (MOU) Records Committee.

The seasons in the checklist are defined as follows:

Sp (Spring) = March, April, May Su (Summer) = June, July

Fa (Fall) = August, September, October, November Wi (Winter) = December, January, February

Abundance codes are defined as follows:

C = Common — present, relatively easy to find

U = Uncommon — observed, may be difficult to find

O = Occasional — may or may not be present in any year

R = Rare — has occurred at least once, may recur
