## Birding Opportunities at Yellow Bank Hills SNA

Yellow Bank Hills SNA is an 80 acre preserve located in the Minnesota River Prairie landscape, in Lac qui Parle County. A dry, sand-gravel prairie community typical of the Great Plains is found here, and includes four rare Minnesota plant species: Missouri milkvetch, Nuttall's violet, cut-leaf ironplant, and soft goldenrod. A total of 84 bird species have been sighted on the unit. Look for western meadowlarks, eastern kingbirds, dickcissels and Harris's sparrow. The adjacent Pegg Lake is a great spot for observing waterfowl during spring migration, as well as American white pelicans, grebes, and gulls at other times. The cattails harbor yellow-headed blackbirds, and marsh and sedge wrens.

Access can be gained from Lac qui Parle Co. Rd. 7 on the east, and Co. Rd. 24 on the north. There are no trails on the site, but hiking is relatively easy from the Co. Rd. 7 parking pull-off, although the hills are steep. Birder access is excellent, and the site is definitely worth a visit.

## **Taxonomy, Season and Abundance Key**

The names and taxonomic arrangement of species follows that of the Checklist of the Birds of Minnesota (January, 2005) prepared by the Minnesota Ornithological Union (MOU) Records Committee.

The seasons in the checklist are defined as follows:

Sp (Spring) = March, April, May Su (Summer) = June, July

Fa (Fall) = August, September, October, November Wi (Winter) = December, January, February

Abundance codes are defined as follows:

C = Common — present, relatively easy to find

U = Uncommon — observed, may be difficult to find

O = Occasional — may or may not be present in any year

R = Rare — has occurred at least once, may recur
