REGULATION HIGHLIGHTS

The OHV Regulations Booklet  should be your first reference for OHV laws, rules, and regulations.

GENERAL OHV REGULATIONS:

- OHV must display valid registration.
- OHV operation in public waters and wetlands is illegal.
- OHV operation on snowmobile trails is illegal.
- ATV Safety Certificate is required for operators born after July 1, 1987, who are age 16 or older to operate on public lands.
- ATV Safety Certificate is required for operators ages 12 to 15 to operate on public lands.



NEW OHV REGULATIONS FOR 2011:

- ATV definition—Engine size increased to 1000 cubic centimeters.
- Non-resident ORV trail pass now required.
- OHMs may also be registered for highway use if safety equipment is added.
- Youth ATV operators may carry one parent or guardian as a passenger.

SAFETY

SIGNS TO WATCH FOR

An off-highway vehicle (OHV) means any motorized vehicle designed for off-highway use.



ATV—All-terrain vehicles,
Class I or Class II



OHM—Off-highway motorcycle



ORV—Off-road vehicles

OHV trail directional arrows are most commonly black on yellow. Only snowmobile are black on orange.



The Minnesota Trail Assistance Program, commonly called grant-in-aid (GIA) provides funds to local governments for trails.



Staying on signed, marked routes ensures trails stay open.



Most state forest roads are open to highway-licensed vehicles as well as OHV use.



Areas with limitations signs are located throughout state forests and mark where the big game hunter/trapper exceptions do not apply. All entry points to these areas will be posted with this sign.

OTHER SIGNS OR SYMBOLS

Volunteer Trail Ambassadors

Trail ambassadors are trained, committed volunteers who have the responsibility of meeting and greeting trail users and helping to educate the public about safe, legal, and environmentally-conscious OHV riding. Ambassadors also play an active role in the Youth ATV Education and Safety Program.



The Volunteer Trail Ambassador Program is a cooperative effort between the All-terrain Vehicle Association of Minnesota (ATVAM), Amateur Riders Motorcycle Association (ARMCA), Minnesota 4-Wheel Drive Association (MN4WDA), Minnesota United Snowmobilers Association (MnUSA), and the MN DNR.

Common Courtesy

Courtesy and respect on the trail make the recreational experience more enjoyable for everyone. Pay attention to signs, stay to the right, and pass cautiously on the left. Yield to non-motorized trail users and shut off OHVs when meeting horseback riders until the horse and rider have passed or you are waved to proceed. Common courtesy helps to keep trails safe for everyone.

Ask First

Ask before entering! Trespassing laws apply to all outdoor recreation, including OHV riding. Avoid conflicts and penalties by talking to the land owner and getting permission to ride on private land. Trespass laws are enforced by all conservation and peace officers.



WHAT TO BRING

Grab your gear:

- Driver's license (if travelling on roads that are not part of a signed trail). ⚡
- Helmet (Department of Transportation approved), over-the-ankle boots, goggles or eye protection, pants, long sleeves, and gloves. Gear should be appropriate for the weather conditions and spare gear is always a good idea—unfavorable weather often happens when it is least expected.
- Vehicle registration.
- Safety Certificate if required by law.
- First-aid kit or other safety equipment.
- Water, snacks, sunscreen, insect repellent, spare parts, and maintenance tools.
- Maps and/or GPS.



HOW TO PREPARE

- Read the OHV Regulations Booklet. ⚡
- Go through safety training to be certified (required for ATV riders born after 1987 and OHM riders under the age of 16 on public lands or trails).
- Know youth safety and special requirements.
- Know what level of difficulty you can safely handle.
- Read the owner's manual and make sure your machine is in good working condition.
- Use extreme caution when carrying a passenger on an ATV. Most machines are made for only one rider.
- Fit your machine to your personal specifications and don't lend it to inexperienced riders. Always supervise youth on OHVs.
- Familiarize yourself with trail difficulty ratings.

Keep in mind your riding ability and what your machine can handle. To maintain control of the OHV, you must adjust your speed for the circumstances and trail conditions.

Townships, cities, counties, and the federal government may further regulate OHV operation on lands and roadways under their jurisdiction. Check with these agencies for their specific OHV regulations. Know what land you're riding on before you go!

COME CLEAN, LEAVE CLEAN

Help stop the spread of land-based invasive species to protect our natural areas. Invasive plant seeds can be transported in mud and hay; likewise eggs and larvae of invasive insects like emerald ash borer can be spread by moving firewood. Help keep your favorite recreation areas free of invasive pests.



Stop Invasive Hitchhikers!

These simple steps can help prevent the spread of invasive plants and animals on land.

BEFORE leaving...BEFORE returning:

- ✓ Inspect and remove mud, plants, and animals from equipment and vehicles.
- ✓ Brush seeds and mud from clothes, boots, gear, and pets.
- ✓ Burn local or certified firewood.
- ✓ Use local weed-free hay.
- ✓ Rinse equipment before transporting.

OHV REGISTRATION

Register and renew your off-highway vehicle in person at any deputy registrar of motor vehicles (where you license your car) or at the DNR License Center, 500 Lafayette Road, St. Paul. Renewals and duplicates may be processed:

At DNR license agents

At the DNR Central Office in St. Paul

OHVs are Required to Display Valid Registration

NOTE: Minnesota OHV registration is NOT required for OHVs registered in another state or country and not in Minnesota for more than 30 days.

NON-RESIDENT STATE TRAIL PASS FOR ATV AND ORV

A trail pass is required for non-residents operating an ATV or ORV not registered in Minnesota on state or grant-in-aid trails. Non-resident Trail Passes are available through the electronic license system (ELS). Find a list of locations at mndnr.gov or by calling the DNR Information Center. ☎

USE YOUR HEAD!

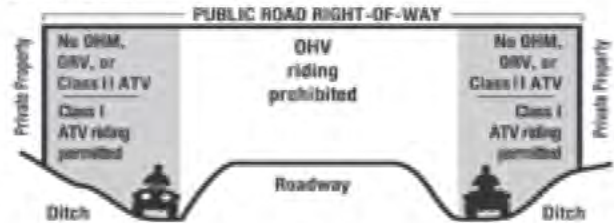
Wearing a DOT-approved helmet is a no-brainer. These are specially designed for riders and do not include standard bicycle helmets and hockey helmets. Operators and riders under age 18 are required to wear an approved helmet while on public lands and trails.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Always use headlights and tail lights.
- Ensure your vehicle meets all state requirements (e.g., mufflers with federally-approved spark arrestor).
- Ride straight, ride safe. Don't consume alcohol when operating any vehicle.
- Ride at a safe speed. Slow down to adjust to current conditions, especially at night!
- Watch for and obey speed limit signs.
- Be aware of special safety requirements, especially those for youth.
- Report accidents (find forms at mndnr.gov/enforcement or at the local county sheriff's office).
- Avoid open water, roads, and questionable ice.
- Stay on signed trails away from wetlands.
 - ◇ There are many different types of wetlands. To avoid harming the environment and incurring penalties, riders should be familiar with the laws, rules, and regulations relating to wetland disturbance. More information can be found at mndnr.gov or in the OHV Regulations Booklet. ⚠ Restrictions apply to public waters and wetlands on both private and public lands.

RESTRICTION HIGHLIGHTS

Refer to the OHV Regulations Booklet ⚠ for road and right-of-way (ditch) restrictions. Avoid highways and do not travel on interstate highway bridges, controlled access/freeway portions of the interstate, state highways, restricted local roads, grant-in-aid snowmobile, and non-motorized trails. Only Class I ATVs are allowed to operate in ditches, unless a ditch is designated as a part of an OHV trail.



You can operate a Class II ATV on state forest roads, certain local roads, and Class II trails. ⚠ Class II ATVs may not be operated on the shoulder of a state trunk highway or in a ditch (even with an agricultural registration) unless designated as a part of an OHV trail.

AGRICULTURAL ZONE

Driving an ATV is prohibited within the right-of-way (ditch) of a state or county highway from April 1 through August 1 in the Agricultural Zone ⚠. This does not apply to ATVs licensed and used for agricultural purposes.



POTENTIAL RISKS OF ATV DESIGN

An ATV is a fun way to enjoy the outdoors, but it's a powerful machine! Look out for these risks:

- A high center of gravity, high ground clearance, and a narrow wheelbase can cause instability and roll-overs on hillsides or when turning.
- ATVs are built to have low pressure off-road tires. This increases the risk of losing control on pavement or hard-pack surfaces.
- Many ATV models have a fixed rear axle for traction. When attempting turns on pavement or hard-pack surfaces, the inner rear wheel may not rotate freely. Loss of control can occur when torque to the inner wheel suddenly releases, causing the ATV to lurch forward unexpectedly.
- Powerful drive trains give ATVs the power to climb or rapidly accelerate.
- ATVs are capable of high speeds, so drivers must be very aware of trail conditions and their own skills.

ATV FIT REQUIREMENTS

A person under age 16 may not operate an ATV on public land, state trails, or grant-in-aid trails, if the person cannot properly reach and control the handlebars and reach the foot pegs while sitting upright on the seat.

ATV PASSENGERS

A person over age 18 may carry one passenger on a Class I ATV and may carry a passenger, or up to the number of passengers for which a Class II ATV was designed. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission does not recommend carrying a passenger unless the ATV is specifically designed for passengers.

Attention: This is a partial listing of Minnesota's OHV laws. For complete regulations consult the OHV Regulations Booklet, state statutes, and rules. ★



YOUTH OPERATORS

Operators and riders under the age of 18 are required to wear an approved helmet while on public lands and trails. Anyone under the age of 16 must have permission from a parent or guardian to operate an ATV or OHM. ORV operation is restricted to operators with a valid driver's license. For complete regulations, consult the OHV Regulations Booklet, state statutes, and rules. ★

TRAVELING ON ICE

Ice is never safe! Check with local authorities before venturing out. ATV and OHM laws require 10 mph or under on the ice of public waters within 100 feet of a person fishing, or a fishing shelter.

- Highway licensed vehicles are allowed on signed forest roads, unless posted closed.
- Off-highway vehicles (ATVs/ORVs/OHMs) are allowed on signed roads and designated trails.
- ATV travel off of signed motor vehicle trails or forest roads is PROHIBITED except when hunter/trapper exception applies.

TEMPORARY CLOSURES

Temporary road and trail closures happen due to spring thaw, trail repairs, heavy rains, logging, natural resource protection or public safety concerns. Closures are unpredictable; always check mndnr.gov/ohv before you ride (updated every Thursday or as conditions change).



SEASONAL RESTRICTION

Trails on state forest lands are closed to recreational riding during firearm deer hunting season in areas of the state where deer may be taken by rifle. State forest roads remain open for OHV use. OHV use with valid deer hunting licenses allowed on forest trails.



NATIONAL FOREST LANDS

National forest lands in Minnesota are open to many public uses including camping, hunting, fishing, trapping, snowmobiling, and OHV riding. State of Minnesota regulations regarding boating, fishing, hunting, ATV riding, or snowmobile operation apply on national forest lands.
