
Brook Trout Fishing

The Necktie River contains both stocked and naturally produced brook trout. Fish can be caught beginning with the stream trout fishing opener in mid-April and anglers can expect to catch fish up to 12 inches in length. Catchable



size brook trout (8 to 10 inches) are generally stocked in early May. This stream has been impacted by beaver activity and habitat improvement projects

have been implemented to improve habitat for brook trout in this stream. Beginning in 2005,



volunteers from the Headwaters Chapter of Trout Unlimited helped anchor Christmas trees along the stream bank in an old beaver meadow


to provide overhead cover for fish and a place for watercress to anchor and grow. This vegetation provides good cover for brook



trout and the small fish and insects that they eat.







The Necktie River lies in northern Hubbard
County approximately 10 miles southeast of
Bemidji. From Bemidji, take US HWY 2 east and
turn south on either 279th Ave. or Hubbard CSAH
45. In addition to 0.5 miles of stream on public
land, trout fishing easements that allow anglers to
walk on the stream bank within 66 feet of the
center of the stream are in place along 2.8 miles of
stream (see map). Note that these easements only
allow fishing and other activities such as camping
and hunting are not allowed. Signs indicate
the angler access corridor and define
where private property begins. Please

respect private property and be a good steward of your stream resources.
