





*Small game seasons vary – check regulations for species



Small Game

• One of Minnesota's longest open seasons for hunting; season varies by game species.

 Common species include rabbit and squirrel, small game season also covers game birds such as grouse, pheasant, woodcock and partridge.

 Sand Dunes State Forest is a popular destination for small game hunting due to it's optimal mix of habitat.



Wild Turkey

 Sand Dunes State Forest is located in turkey permit area 507, which encompasses all or part of 15 counties.

• This permit area is located within the prairie/forest transition area of central and west-central Minnesota.

• Perfect mixture agricultural, grassland, and woodland habitats for wild turkey.



Wild Turkey

• The turkey population in this permit area has prospered since the early-1990s.

• Turkeys were established beginning in 1983 by releasing over 1,300 birds at 70 sites within the permit area.

Spring hunter densities in the permit area are relatively low with less than one hunter for every 4 sq. miles of land base.



Waterfowl

• Sand Dunes State Forest is in the central duck and goose zone and sees limited hunting in the fall.

• Waterfowl hunting occurs on the south end of Ann Lake, some of the bogs bordering SDSF and some sections of the Saint Francis River.

• Season and bag limits are outlined in the annual waterfowl regulations supplement.



• Minnesota's most abundant big game species.

• Very adaptable, found in every county in Minnesota.

• Favor early succession forest, woodland, open grassland and brushland habitat.



• Deer prefer "edge" habitat and diverse landscapes that provide food, cover, water and space.

 Most important spring/summer food sources include grasses, buds and blossoms from a variety of herbs, shrubs and trees.

• <u>Acorns</u> provide important nutrition in the fall and winter as deer build up fat reserves.



• Sand Dunes State Forest is part of deer permit area 223, including most of Sherburne County.

• This permit area is designated as "Managed" for 2016, allowing a two deer bag limit.

• Hunters can use any combination of licenses and bonus permits to tag both deer (archery, firearms, muzzleloader).



• Stakeholder advisory teams met in 2015 to provide input for deer population goals in Central Minnesota.

• Recommended a 25% increase in deer populations in permit area 223 over 2014 population estimates.

• 2014 and 2015 deer seasons were conservative – Hunter's Choice (one deer limit, buck or doe).



• Consecutive mild winters (2014 & 2015) coupled with conservative regulations have increased deer populations.

• Target density is 16-21 deer per square mile.




Deer Populations and Management

Hunting seasons and regulations are the primary means of managing deer populations.

Strong firearms and archery deer hunting participation in permit area 223 allows for stable deer herd management.
