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
We are writing to you in support of the Tenant Farmer's House at the Charles A. Lindbergh State Park in Little Falls, MN.

Your letter of May 9, 2011 to Courtland Nelson was forwarded to me. I appreciate your letter and an opportunity to respond.

Parks and Trails staff share your concern about the deteriorating condition of the Tenant Farmer House at Charles Lindbergh State Park. I've had a couple of conversations with the park manager recently related to this issue and have discussed the situation with our Regional Building & Facilities Advisor. I also plan to discuss this issue with our development and archeology staff for additional input and direction.

I know there is serious water damage to the building interior and likely associated rot and mold issues as well. With the age of this building we may also have issues with asbestos. Park staff do not enter the building unless absolutely necessary and then only if wearing a mask or respirator. The safety of the interior structure is also in question.

I'm sure you are aware of the current state budget situation. While this structure certainly has value from a historic and interpretive perspective, we also have to weigh it against other statewide needs and available funding. We are certainly willing to work with the Minnesota Historical Society to address the funding issue and determine a course of action. An unfortunate reality may be that the structure has deteriorated to the point that it is no longer physically or economically feasible to save. If that is the case, part of the solution could include improved non-personal interpretation of the site and the story represented there.

I hope to visit the site soon for a first-hand look at the structure and further discussion with the park manager and district supervisor. I truly appreciate the interest and concern the "Friends of the Lindbergh Heritage" have in preserving this structure. Your support of both the park and historic site are greatly appreciated.



Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the above listed Environmental Assessment Worksheet. While there are no currently recorded archaeological sites, archaeological site leads, or burials in the project area, there is a high potential for significant, intact archaeological resources in the project area associated with the Tenant Farmer's House, which per the Minnesota State Historic Preservation Office, as noted in Section 15 of the EAW, should be considered and treated as a contributing building as it was part of the property and is within the historic district boundary. The EAW states a phase I archaeological reconnaissance was completed for the project, but the results are not yet available. Since the report is not available for review the OSA is unable to evaluate the report to determine if the work was sufficient. The OSA requests a copy of the report be submitted to this office upon completion, before the project commences, to make recommendations at that time regarding the survey's sufficiency.

It is unfortunate that it was not seen as worthy of preservation and fell into disrepair and that efforts by the Friends of the Lindbergh Society were not successful in having management of the home transfered to the historical society.


My interest goes beyond advocating for preservation of an important historical structure - it is personal. My grandfather, Gustav (Gus) Gertz was the tenant farmer you cite in your notice. Our family was aware of this, but took particular interest in 2012 when we discovered that tours of the Lindbergh site were often led by a living history character....Gus Gertz! Many members of the family visited and took tours to hear what "Gus" had to say. We learned that the historical society knew little about him, believed that he was a single man during his tenure on the farm and had no, or few, pictures of Gus. We were able provide them with an accurate account of who he was along with many pictures of his time on the farm. Gus was married to Alma and they had three children all living on the farm - Zella, Evelyn (my mother) and Alvin. Charles refers to "tenant farmer Gertz in his book "Lindbergh Looks Back, A Boyhood Reminisence". We believe that Gus and Charlie had a very familiar relationship as, together, they managed the farm during the years Charles Sr. was a senator in Washington. I have attached some photos of interest: grandpa on a hay wagon; with his favorite cow, Princess; and seated in a plane, quite likely one of Charlie's. There is also a photo of the family and one of my mother sitting on a log over the creek.

Is there no way the structure can be saved? The tenant farmers house was a home where a family lived, participating in the daily life of the Lindbergh family and contributing to Minnesota history. I hope there can be renewed effort to preserve this important and meaningful piece of history.

Hi Kathy,

I talked to you on the phone and am sending this letter as a follow-up.

I think the Lindberg Tenant Farmers Home should be preserved, given its historic nature and designation on the National Register of Historic Places. Locally, we just heard about this a week ago, so we need time to work out a solution with the DNR. Hopefully there's no rush to tear it down. Are there any deadlines, or an upcoming public meeting?

It is possible to preserve the home. I went and looked at it, I'm a real estate agent and have done rehabs. The framing, trusses, roof, and flooring in the original home could be replaced as needed. For the addition, it may be best to let it go (but there are some pine trees growing out of the roof there that should be transplanted somewhere or I could take).

I think there are a few good options to restore the home. First, the DNR can allow locals to preserve the home where it stands. The community has a history of volunteering to preserve historic properties (the MLS lists homes for sale). Alternately, I recommend publicly listing it for sale on the MLS as "to be moved." I think someone would buy the home for its historic nature, maybe use it for an AirBNB or something like that. The DNR won't know if there's a buyer unless it's listed.

# Proposals to Preserve the Lindbergh Tenant Farmers Home

# <u>Proposal I: Allowing Local Residents to Restore the Home</u>

I agree with local preservationists that the best option is to restore the home, rather than move it and have it disappear from its original building spot. Says one, "We sure do not want to see more destruction or demolition by neglect to more historic places in Little Falls."

The home could have a fence put around it so it doesn't endanger the public while people could work on bringing it back to some use.

Little Falls has a history of residents supporting historical homes. For example, previously residents volunteered to work on the historic Dewey-Radke house, such as meeting together to tuckpoint it. There are several groups of people who regularly look for ways to help the public that have been and can be called upon: Retired carpenters, sentence-to-serve personnel, Northern Bedrock Historic Preservation Corps, Eagle Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Girl Scout projects.

Give us some time, and we can put out a call to the community and formulate a more concrete solution here.

# Proposal II. List the Home as "To Be Moved"

Secondly, I recommend listing the home for sale in the MLS as "to be moved." Periodically, such listings appear in the MLS. I think a historical home like the Lindbergh Tenant Home would fetch a great deal of interest as a historical property, especially since it's on the national historic register. The real estate market is still exceedingly hot and there is limited inventory. Combined with the home's National Registry designation, I think a buyer can be found.

I did some brief research and found four houses listed as "to be moved" in the MLS. Three sold and one was cancelled (it was listed very high, \$100K, we don't know if it was later sold or moved). Of the three houses that sold, the average days on market (DOM) was 61 days, with the selling prices ranged from \$10- \$48K (older houses were lower, newer mobile home was highest). See attached document for those listings and a one-page comparison.

# a. MLS Listing Benefits

90% of buyers first search online for MLS listings, so the MLS is the best way to have access to the largest market of buyers. The MLS listings are propagated to numerous free online sites, such as Zillow and Trulia, which are visible internationally. When selling, it is basically essential to list in the MLS, or you severely limit your market and are more likely to meet with the result of no sale.

A listing in the MLS with a standard agent could run \$1-2K, plus closing costs, depending on the type of contract you sign. The DNR could put out a call for bids.

You can also list in the MLS via flat-fee agencies such as <a href="https://remoe.com/">https://remoe.com/</a> or <a href="https://www.homeavenue.com/selling/compare-packages/">https://remoe.com/</a> or <a href="https://www.homeavenue.com/selling/compare-packages/">https://remoe.com/</a> or <a href="https://remoe.com/">https://remoe.com/</a> or <a href="https://remoe.com/</a> or <a href="https://remoe.com/">https://remoe.com/</a> sold for under \$500. However, this will require you to do the showings and fill out the paperwork on your own.

## b. Sale Price

I would recommend nominal pricing. Given its condition, you are basically looking for someone to do you a favor and move it out. The buyer is typically responsible for the moving costs.

I have been researching house-moving lately, as I am considering moving a relative's historical home. Johnson's Moving (see below) told me that the cost of moving can range from \$15-\$25K if moved locally, so a buyer will be factoring that in.

# b. Timing

A house project can be a big move, so I would recommend listing it for up to a year. This will also provide access to the largest pool of potential buyers.

The MLS allows auction listings. If the DNR wants to do an auction, I would recommend several months lead time, again, to find the largest pool of potential buyers. If it didn't sell right away, it can still continue to be listed on the MLS.

Once a buyer is found, it takes time to prepare land to receive a home, including putting in a foundation and possible utilities. I would recommend that the DNR allow a buyer a year to move the home. The home could be fenced if the DNR prefers. This would be less expensive than full demolition.

# d. House Moving Companies

From what I could see, there is room to move the house out without having to take down any trees.

Dear Ms. Metzker and members of the Environmental Review Unit,

The following suggestions could resolve much of the opposition to the DNR's plans to demolish the Tenant Farmer's House at Lindbergh State Park. This plan would preserve the original house, while eliminating the multitude of problems caused by its isolated location within the park. It would also eliminate the incongruous connection with the rustic style of architecture of the park buildings. The plan would utilize much of the prior required paperwork that has been created to this point, since it would demolish only part of the structure (the 1960s addition). It would salvage the original house by moving it across the highway to a new location within the fenced area of the Lindbergh site. Moving the small 896 square foot original structure would not be difficult if it was disconnected from the addition and reinforced for the move. Moving it could be done without cutting a single tree within the park area, and with minimal tree removal within the fenced area south of the Lindbergh house. This would provide protection for the tenant's house while allowing time to organize a reconstruction plan. This could involve seeking funds from both public and private sources, and including possible volunteer labor and donations. Parts of the old rock/mortar foundation could be incorporated into a new foundation after removal from the present site. Most of the paperwork by the DNR and other agencies has already been done; the main changes would be to delete "demolishing" from descriptions of the original structure and apply the word only to the 1960s addition. Internal

park "moving" would best describe the original wooden structure.

Moving and salvaging the original tenant farmer's home would not only provide additional interest and access for tour groups, but it would unify the Lindbergh site. It could provide a focal point, or possibly a classroom, for discussions about a once common agricultural practice of tenant farming. Visitors would not have to risk crossing a busy highway to view the tenant's house, and with a location adjacent to the Lindbergh home, it would be more welcoming to guests. This new location would also remain consistent with the original farm acreage.

To summarize: The above plan would allow the Minnesota Historical Society to have a unified site to present the Lindbergh history; it would allow the DNR to unify its rustic style and natural message to the public; it would secure the Tenant Farmer's House with fencing; it would eliminate the dangers of crossing a highway; it would eliminate the building's present danger to the public; and it would allow the Department of Natural Resources and the Minnesota Historical Society to fulfill their responsibility to safeguard a National Historic Landmark.

I hope this plan will be seriously discussed before any final decisions are made regarding the Tenant Farmer's House, one of the few remaining architectural remnants of Lindbergh history.
