VISITOR TIPS

- Snowshoes and skis available for rent. Call ahead for facility hours and availability of rental equipment.
- Many areas are not plowed in winter. For winter camping, call the park for details.
- Annie Battle Lake is a designated Heritage Fishery – no motorized vehicles, power augers or electronics, special limits apply.
- Ski passes are required for skiers 16 and older.
- In an emergency call 911.

ONLY HAVE AN HOUR?

- Ski the Lake Emma Trail or snowshoe around Sunset Lake. Skis and snowshoes can be rented at the park office.
- Watch for deer along the park road and view the displays on park history at the Glendalough Lodge.
- Take an exhilarating ride down the park's sledding hill. Check out a sled at the park office if you need one.
- Drop a line in Molly Stark Lake, your best bet for winter ice fishing.



ABOUT THE PARK

For over sixty years, the Glendalough property was owned by the Minneapolis Tribune as a private retreat and game farm. This resulted in the preservation of hundreds of acres of land and miles of undeveloped shoreline on five lakes. During its heyday, the Glendalough Lodge on pristine Annie Battle Lake hosted executives, politicians, and dignitaries, including two future U.S. presidents. Glendalough, meaning "the glen between two lakes," was named by Tribune owner F.E. Murphy and his wife who were of Irish descent.



Explore the park's diverse landscapes.

- TRAIL HIGHLIGHTS -

Beaver Pond Interpretive Trail

Cross-country ski level: Easy

Glendalough's most popular trail follows a crystal clear stream through forest and meadow and returns along Blanche Lake. Watch for otters and waterfowl along the creek.

Lake Emma Trail 2-mile loop

Cross-country ski level: Intermediate

This wooded, remote trail features an observation platform overlooking Lake Emma. Extend your ski along the north side of the lake, an area often inaccessible during other seasons.

Sunset Lake Trail 1-mile loop

Snowshoe: Hilly

Entirely circling Sunset Lake, this trail passes through the former game farm and offers spectacular vistas of the winter landscape. Watch for an extra spur on the north side to take you to an overlook where you might see otters and waterfowl on the slough.

Annie Battle Lake Trail 3.3 mile loop

Cross-country ski level: Easy / Hike or snowshoe to yurts (2 miles): Level

The wider portion of this trail is groomed for multiple uses. Non-skiers and pets need to keep off the ski track and not go beyond the yurts. Skiers can access the trail from their yurt or camper cabin and circle the lake. Watch for owls and bald eagles.

MORE TO EXPLORE AT THE PARK _____

- Winter is a great time to explore! Take your snowshoes and make your own trail through the woods, build your own snow shelter on a campsite, or clear off some ice for skating while you drop a fishing line.
- Battle Lake, just three miles away, boasts intriguing shops, enticing restaurants, and even a fascinating Civil War museum when the weather gets too cold for outdoor activities.

PARK OPEN

8 a.m.-10 p.m. daily.



VEHICLE PERMITS

Permits required; purchase at park office or entrance kiosk.



PFTS WFLCOME

Keep on leash: pick up after: attend at all times; not allowed in buildings.



1.4-mile loop

CAMPGROUND QUIET HOURS

10 p.m. – 8 a.m.; only registered campers may be in campground during quiet hours.



FIREWOOD

Must be purchased at this park or from vendors who sell wood approved for this park; no gathering firewood in the park.

BE OUR GUEST

- Reserve a cabin, yurt or campsite and stay awhile (mndnr.gov/reservations).
- Reserve the historic lodge for a day of winter activities and warm up with family or friends by the cozy fireplace.
