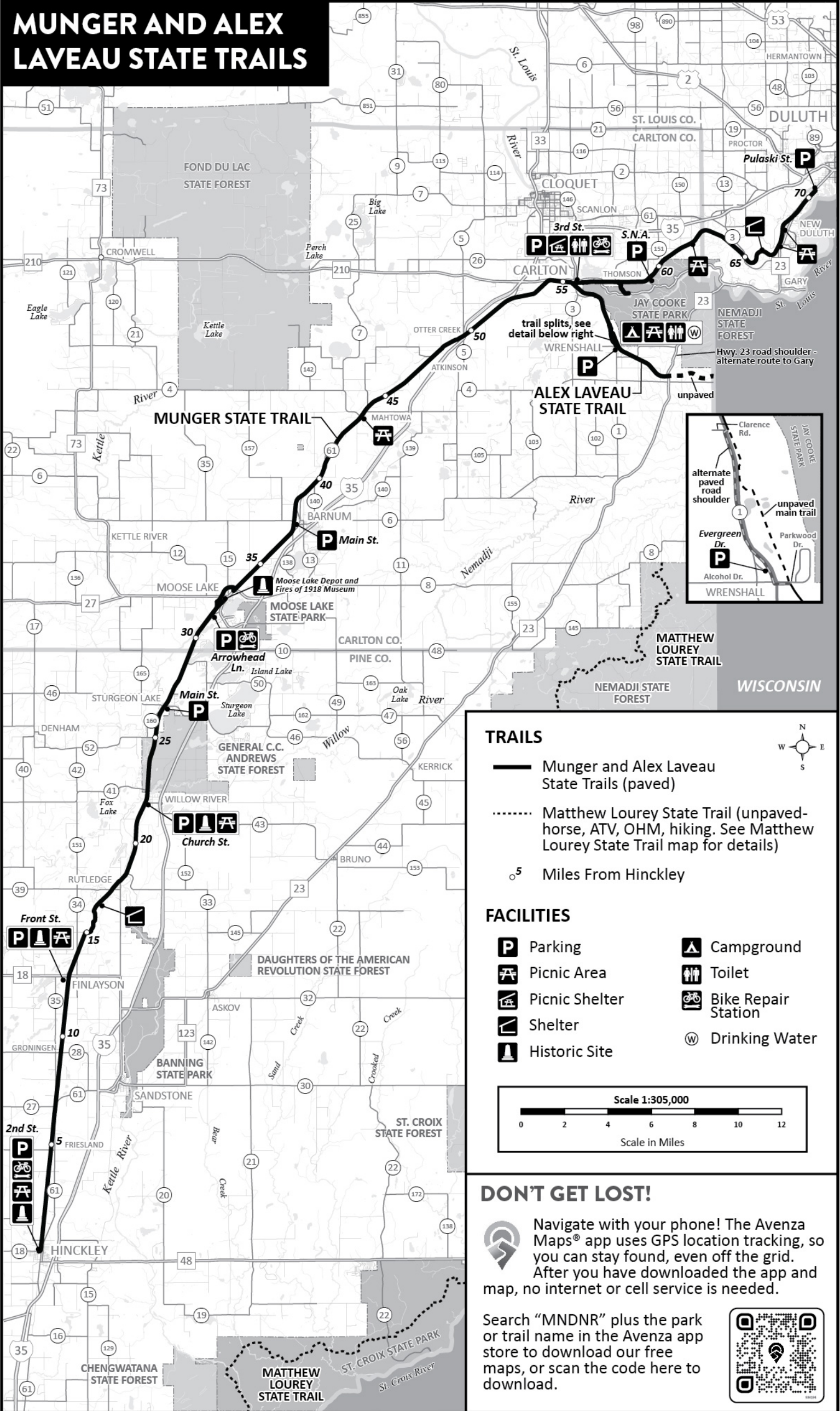

SHARE THE TRAIL

- Stay on designated trail.
- Keep right so others can pass.
- Keep pets on leash and dispose of waste.
- Obey traffic signs and rules.
- Pack out all garbage and litter.
- Respect adjoining landowner’s rights and privacy.
- Verbally warn other trail users when passing from behind.
- Overnight camping and campfires are permitted only on designated campsites. Do not leave them unattended.
- Enjoy the beauty of wild plants and animals, but leave them undisturbed for all to enjoy.
- Trail users are legally responsible for obeying the rules and regulations provided in Minnesota Rules, 6100.3000.

ABOUT THE TRAILS

The Munger State Trail is a multiple-use trail between Hinkley and Duluth. This 70-mile paved trail offers opportunities for hiking, bicycling, in-line skating and snowmobiling. A parallel grassy trail runs from Finlayson to Willow River for horseback riding.

You’ll experience the picturesque scenery and rich history of East Central Minnesota along the trail. Portions follow the railroad route that saved many lives in the historic Hinkley fire of the nineteenth century.

The trail travels near Banning and Moose Lake state parks, through the towns of Finlayson, Willow River, Moose Lake, Barnum and Carlton, and through General C.C. Andrews

State Forest and the spectacular scenery of Jay Cooke State Park. The trail is also part of the 315-mile North Star/U.S. 41 Bicycle Route.

The northeast portion of the trail offers scenic views of the St. Louis River and the twin ports of Duluth and Superior.

The Alex Laveau State Trail travels from the junction of the Munger State Trail in Carlton, 6.5 miles through the town of Wrenshall to Highway 23. From Highway 23 travel 9.5 miles to Gary-New Duluth along paved road shoulders. An additional 2 miles of gravel trail goes from Highway 23 to the Minnesota/Wisconsin border.

This trail honors the memory of a former county commissioner and dairy farmer who was a strong advocate of repurposing abandoned railways as public trails.

The Willard Munger Trail System includes the Gateway, Brown’s Creek, Munger and Alex Laveau state trails. The system is named after a legendary lawmaker known for his environmental legislation and support of Minnesota’s state bike trail systems. 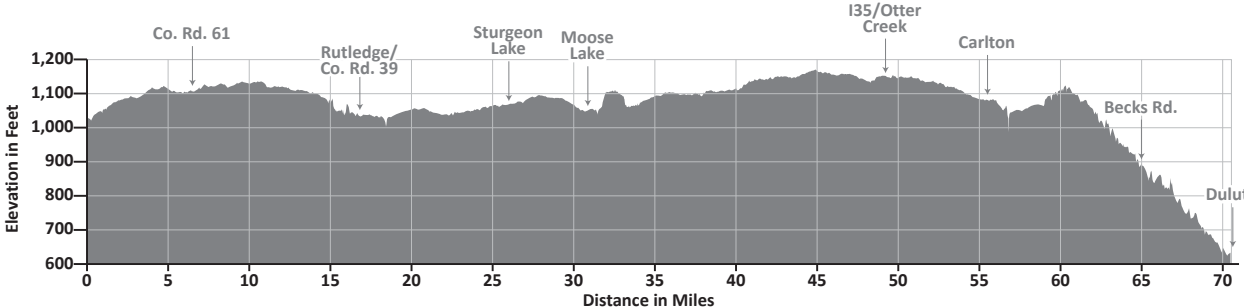


PLEASE NOTE
